## Ginzburg to Deliver Fribolin Lecture

Yankel Ginzburg, a leading contemporary American artist who received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree at the College's 2007 commencement, is returning to campus.

Ginzburg, whose work is featured in the Robert S. and Rebecca Bannan Aben Gallery, will deliver the 20th Annual Carl and Fanny Fribolin Lecture Friday, May 2 at 6:30 p.m. in Norton Chapel.

Ginzburg's influence extends beyond the art world. The first Israeli artist to exhibit in Cairo, Egypt, he is a respected authority on Middle East politics and has been called on to discuss the peace process with such world leaders as Golda Meir, Richard Nixon, Anwar Sadat, Menachem Begin, Jimmy Carter, Boris Yeltsin, and Bill Clinton.

In addition to founding new art movements and creating monumental sculptures, Ginzburg is a major philanthropist and advocate of charitable causes.

He helped establish the Fund for Democracy and Development in 1991, was nominated for the Horatio Alger Award in 1992 and, that same year, was honored by President Boris Yeltsin and the Supreme Soviet of the Russian Federation with the Humanitarian Honor First Class.



## Randy Kuhl: The Sequel

U.S. Rep. John R. "Randy" Kuhl, who delivered the commencement address at Keuka in 2001, will make an encore performance at the 100th commencement May 25.

"Randy was the No. 1 choice of our senior class officers," said College President Joseph G. Burke.

Kuhl, a Republican, was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 2004 and now represents the 29th Congressional District of New York, which includes parts of eight counties in the Southern Tier and Finger Lakes region, and the southern suburbs of Rochester.

Kuhl, who was re-elected to the House in 2006, serves on three committees, including the Committee on Education and Labor, and its subcommittees on Early Childhood, Elementary, and Secondary Education and Higher Education, Lifelong Learning and Competitiveness.

Kuhl received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree at the 2001 commencement.



## Trickle-Down Effect

Lightner Library wasn't the only beneficiary of the annual Friends of the Lightner Library Book Sale last fall.

The book sale realized nearly \$2,200 for the library's collection and services. With the most expensive book selling for a mere \$1.25, that adds up to myriad books being added to home libraries everywhere.

But what happened to the books that were not sold?

According to Tom Yost, president of the Friends of Lightner Library and organizer of the sale, some children's books were donated to Christmas for the Needy in Penn Yan, while others were given to the Reading Partnership in Ithaca, an organization that gives books to young readers in the Ithaca area.

Fiction paperbacks were divided between the Yates County Jail, Ontario County Jail, and the Rochester City School District General Education Degree (GED) program. Large print books were delivered to Clinton Crest Manor in Penn Yan, while religious books stayed right on campus to benefit the College's Gathered in Faith Together (GIFT) Club.

Other books were donated to start libraries at Keuka Comfort Care Home in Penn Yan and the Wayne-Finger Lakes BOCES Center for Experiential Learning in Flint.
